

HOUSING AS MEDICINE

COVID-19 has shown us just how crucial stable housing and a strong community truly are to our well-being. RACDC has continued to provide affordable housing to over **245** families and individuals, and connected dozens more to ancillary services and area partner organizations.

In 2021, our team has worked diligently to improve existing housing options with planned renovations at Randolph House, design and permitting of a new net zero development at the old Ethan Allen Furniture site in Downtown Randolph, and fundraising for porch and ramp restorations at Joslyn House.

A PLACE WE CALL HOME

"Our family moved to Vermont early this year after I got a job at Nolato G.W. Plastics in Bethel. When we first arrived, we stayed in a hotel while trying to find a place to rent. Little did we know that the process of finding a place would take us months. For a number of reasons, between time of year, consequences of Covid, and fluctuations in the housing market there was next to no availability for our family. We were finally saved when we contacted RACDC about a rental listing for the Armstrong Trailer Park. It seemed like every other place in the area had been evicting tenants and selling their property, but **RACDC was there to help us find a place to live**."

They provide custom design and prototyping services to a variety of clients in the medical, tech, and product manufacturing industries.

Brian Kippen, Tunbridge native and founder of KAD, and his team opened the business' Vermont satellite site in 2020, and was able to get the shop outfitted to begin operations thanks to funds made available by the BRLF.

Some of this year's highlights include welcoming the return of Amtrak service, a community block party, and our Annual Meeting featuring speakers on energy resilience.


